Alex: Study in America

Marie Alexandra Michelle Beneteau is teaching Level 2 students now. She is a new teacher who's both elegant and gorgeous. She used to be a teacher at Tsinghua University. Spending the majority of her life in the States, she has received an American education for years. Therefore, we conducted an interview with Alex about American education, which provided us with a lot of insights and details of this advanced system. **STB: The tuition in America is really expensive, and I have heard many American parents don't allow their children to go to university. Is that true?**

Alex: A lot of parents want their children to go to the university. Luckily or unluckily, it depends on how you look at it. The government provides financial assistance. But you have to pay them back, at a very high interest rate. But you know, when you're young, before you go to school, you don't have a job, but when you graduate, you will get a good job. So they don't ask you to pay them back until you get a good job. So it's possible for people to go to university, even if you don't have money in your pocket.

STB: Most Chinese students believe that, generally, American students don't have much homework or courses in primary or middle school. Is that true? Could you tell us something about your school life?

Alex: I think in primary school there's quite a bit of homework. Probably, it is different state by state. We have history, math, science, geography, spelling, English vocabulary, foreign languages [she took a Spanish course in primary school, and French in high school and college], PE. That's it. After school, most people do sports or go to clubs. I danced ballet after school. It's more important for socialization, like hanging out with your friends in America.

STB: Do you feel stressed to have so many classes?

Alex: No, not really. No stress. I think in primary school we have 30 minutes to 1 hour of homework. In middle school 1 hour, and in high school 1 hour to 2 hours at most.



STB: Before we enter university, we have to take the College Entrance Exam. In America, SAT is a way to select students. Could you tell me how you prepared for your SAT?

Alex: Yep! I had a book, an SAT quiz book. I just tested in it and practiced

questions. We were given strategies to help answer the questions. I probably worked in that book an hour a day, but I still went to my activities after school, like ballet practice. My teachers told me not to study before the test, but have a good rest. Because they think you can't learn anything new, just let your brain rest. But we studied about 6 weeks before.

Through this interview, we can take a glance at American education. American education is really different from Chinese education. Thanks Alex for a good description of education in America.







As an old saying goes, one minute on the stage takes ten years of practice. Every participant must have studied a very long time before mastering good methods of learning English. For example, Amber, a sophomore student with excellent spoken English, always takes part in various activities in CILL and tries her best to seize every chance to speak in class.

It's common to hear some students complain that they are too busy to make time to learn English. But it can't be an excuse to stop you from learning English. Mickey, the coordinator of English Festival, gave her similar understanding of singing, "Singing is not simply singing. It is related to performance and expression. Challenging Toastmasters

"Toastmasters" is an activity held in CILL every Tuesday. In this activity, a number of students gather together to practice making a short speech with the help of teachers, namely Paul and Tian.

The activity generally contains two parts. The first part is that every group chooses two leaders and they take turns to lead the discussion. Another part is that every group needs to select one person as their representative to make a short speech. The speech topic depends on what the teacher shows on PPT.

During the discussion part, the teacher always encourages the leaders and helps them move the discussion forward. A leader once mentioned, "A school in London owns 600 students with 42 languages in total." But his group couldn't continue this topic. Thus the leader was disappointed and had to



say "Maybe this topic is boring, let's talk about another one." However, Paul told the leader: "You should try your best to continue your discussion rather than stop it for its boredom." Hearing this, the leader found a way out and asked the group to share their opinions about the advantages and disadvantages of so many languages spoken in a school.

The most exciting part comes after the twenty-minute discussion. In this part, only one student can represent his or her group to make a short and impromptu speech after seeing a picture provided by the teacher. Once Paul showed a picture containing two parts: One was a boy watching TV at home while another was the same boy sitting in the forest. At the beginning, most participants felt frustrated because they didn't know how to talk about it. Therefore, Paul encouraged the students: "I know some of you are afraid of making a speech in public without preparation. Maybe it's really kind of difficult, but if you want to be a good toastmaster, it is of great necessity to have a try." Thanks to Paul's encouragement, one girl finished her speech using some typical examples and old sayings, with the topic that a child should get close to nature.

Sometimes, visitors are supposed to give comments to the speaker, a



speaker named Emma once said, "When I was asked questions, I think it's not a challenge, but an improvement." What deserves to be mentioned is that Tian prefers to ask the speaker to talk about the picture in different ways.

The teachers win great applause for their commitments. Nancy, a sophomore from Journalism School, thought highly of the teachers: "Paul is pretty handsome. Tian always smiles with two dimples. They contribute a lot for this activity. What's more, they tell me a lot about how to describe the picture extensively. I really appreciate them and this activity deeply."

According to the students' reactions, most of them have decided to overcome their fear of making mistakes and try their best to make a short impromptu speech in Toastmasters under the teachers' quidance.

Another overseas student, Roger, who went to Melbourne this summer, was telling us about a special feeling he had in the foreign land. "It is the first time that I study overseas in Melbourne without company of my parents. I feel a little lonely. However, there are many activities in Melbourne to celebrate Mid-Autumn Festival with Chinese. I am going to take part in some of them and enjoy the dinner. After that, I will have a video chat with my parents by WeChat and share my life here with them," said Roger.

Nevertheless, even when living in a city where it is easy to find Chinese people, students can have different feelings about Mid-Autumn Festival. Fang Yichun and Li Ziyang, two exchange students who are studying in Singapore, gave us two totally different perspectives. To maintain the same tone of happiness, Li said, "The Singapore Teochew Students' Association provides a warm party for Chinese students who come from the Chao-shan Area and they always have a good time together every year."

In opposition to the previous tones,

Fang put forward her own point: "I guess the importance of such traditional festivals and rituals is gradually fading here. There is no public holiday for Mid-Autumn but I feel partly it's because Singapore is multiracial. Some of the celebrations take place mainly in Chinese schools. Also now for students it is during the exam period. 'We can't even finish reading the notes, let alone taking a break to eat moon cakes!'

It's never easy to live alone in a foreign country, away from everything you're familiar with. To all the STU students who are currently studying abroad, we hope your hard work will be rewarded and all of your efforts will result in a great harvest!






