
# Practicing Oral Presentation

Many of us experienced the excitement of watching the Intercollegiate English Speech Contest at our 4th English Festival (Dec. 8–10, 2005). Perhaps you were impressed by the powerful speeches delivered by many contestants and their concise but meaningful answers to the unseen questions. I have to say that this kind of performance—delivering a speech in front of a large audience—is by no means easy, as it takes years of practice to reach this level. But all of you have the chance to become good public speakers in English, so long as you try hard.

I am going to introduce you to a way to start: oral presentation. By which I mean, you present

your ideas or viewpoints to a small group around a table or in a classroom, and you don't even need to stand up to address the audience. Oral presentation is different from public speaking in that the latter usually occurs in a formal setting with a lot of people in the audience. An oral presentation is rather informal and it can be delivered from an outline, while public speaking is formal and speakers usually deliver their presentations from a prepared manuscript. Moreover, an oral presentation is more interactive, and it is often short and delivered to smaller audiences. Because oral presentations will always be a part of your academic and professional life you should practice this skill.

#### **LANGUAGE AND CULTURE: ARE THEY RELATED?**

When learning their native language, most people never think about the cultural implications of their language use. For example, sometimes you might hear people say, "I don't know why we say 'that,' but we just do!" Certain language usages are often influenced by culture, and sometimes different aspects of culture(s) are also contained within the language itself.

Let's consider English, more specifically English used in the American culture. Many experts claim that America is a DOING culture (as opposed to BEING or THINKING), which simply suggests that the American culture is a possible to be a possible

can culture is oriented towards activities that promote striving, achieving and accomplishing. All of this is reflected in the fact that most Americans are very time—oriented and conscious of how they spend their time, which is largely indicated in American English language.

Most noticeable in the English language is the use of troublesome tense structures (i.e., Past tense, Past progressive, Past perfect, Present tense, etc.). These structures suggest that time is very important to the English language, particularly in the American culture. Furthermore, many idiomatic expressions that relate to time also

occur in English. For example, "Time is money," "Haste makes waste," "The early bird gets the worm," "In a New York minute," and "Waste time." All of these examples refer to the importance of time in the culture, and also support the notion that America is indeed a DOING culture.

It's essential to consider the language when considering the culture and vice versa, because knowing this information can prepare you to better understand how language and culture interact. When learning the English language, paying attention to its time—orientation will help your understanding of how the target culture operates and thinks. Overall, this might contribute to promoting cultural understanding, simply by looking at the language of that culture.

In the end, it's important for language learners to understand that when you are learning another language you are incidentally learning something about that culture, whether you realize it or not. Therefore, pay attention to all parts of the language now and it might help you avoid communication problems "From time to time."

Also, as students discover new and different sentence structures in books, magazines and other readings they can put these to use in their own writing.

cuss the materials they have read. During this meeting students share and challenge each other's opinions and ideas that have been informed by their reading.

Futhermore, every member of the Reading Club helps to decide what topics will be read. This way, students read about issues or stories that are interesting, relevant and important to them.

has a hidden psychological weakness deep inside his heart. He lacks self-confidence and hope in the future of his skilled career.



#### Summer in Kabul

Afghanistan, a small and poor nation in southwest-central Asia, was relatively unknown to the world until war between the Taliban and America broke out four years ago.

John Noonan, a journalist from the U.S, chose not to spend his last summer vacation in the sun of a relaxing beach. Instead he traveled to Kabul, the capital of Afghanistan, as he said, "not for pleasure, but for journalism." Several weeks ago, he shared his experiences, wonderful photos and video with students in English Corner.

He and a colleague prepared for six months leading up to the trip, but after arriving in Kabul found things were completely different from anything they had read. "We just forgot about all the reference books and started over," John said.

As we know, battles happen frequently in Afghanistan, and John admitted that he and his colleague were very afraid. He said that on

one occasion a hotel that they'd just left five or six hours earlier was bombed. Everyday death seemed close.

What impressed John most about his time in Afghanistan were the the refugees people, Before arriving he had thought most people there were terrorists whose eyes were filled with revenge. However, after talking to and staying with the refugees, John discovered they were normal folk with normal desires, such as finding

stable jobs and feeding their kids. The local people were also hospitable. John explained that he got nervous when he was invited to dinner by a family because the family was usually poor and would use all their food to serve him. Amidst the horrible daily battles, the Afghanis led a simple life.





## **Practicing Oral Presentation**

(continued P.1)(e.g., silence, confusion, and boredom). Thirdly, a good oral presentation is ethical, by which I mean, you will try to present with good logic and reasoning, and at the same time, with empathy and sympathy. For instance, if I present to you my idea of what a good learner of English should be, and I ask those of you who failed your English finals to raise your hands, I will likely cause the embarrassment of those students. The bottom line is that, as a presenter, you should put yourself in the audience's shoes and not advocate any behavior that may cause potential unease for your audience.

To help you practice your oral presentation

skills, I would like to offer the following tips:

- Write down your presentation in an outline, which should be appropriate in length, well organized, with adequate support.
- Practice delivering your presentation from your speaking outline and rehearse the presentation a few times until you are comfortable with the outline you have prepared.
- 3. Once you are familiar with what you are going to say, try to add some of the aspects of delivery (e.g., body movement, eye contact, gestures, pauses, and pitch) to your oral presentation.
- 4. Try videotaping yourself speaking into a tape recorder, or talking in front of a mirror - all these

will help you get a good sense of what your presentation might sound and look like to your intended audience.

- Rehearse in a similar situation such as a classroom or lecture hall to get comfortable with the place where you will make your oral presentation.
- 6. Carefully observe how others do their presenand then learn from their strengths and weaknesses. It is always helpful to watch some professional speakers on the Internet or video.


